Sure here's the version we used for North South Road. I expect minor revisions and the addition of the LICH Invasive Plant List.

Keep in mind that the species listed in this section are typical of the area of Kapolei where NS Road is being built and probably are similar to many areas of the city's rail but meeting with Oahu Invasive Species Council will provide a relevant list for the city.

Hi Christopher, Thanks for getting back with me. I am working on the rail project with PB and am trying to find out if there are standard specifications for controlling invasive species for DOT projects. We have had several comments from agencies and individuals and, while I find it important and interesting, I don't know much about controlling invasive species for a construction project. For example, is there any requirement to steam clean construction equipment that comes into the state or moves between islands? Is there a list of species that cannot be used for landscaping in state projects because they can 'get loose' and invade beyond landscaped areas? I asked Nelson because he helped me with information on the endangered abutilon plant previously. Thanks for any direction you can give me.
