


The genuineness of the above Cited Conveyance, having
 been satisfactorily proved to this Board would leave nothing
 further to determine of an ambiguous nature, had not some
 alleged infraction of the above agreement, for which an
 equivalent became demanded by the Party aggrieved, viz
 James Robinson, caused a long suspension of the case.
 The obstruction being at length removed out of the way of
 a final settlement, by mutual concession satisfactory to
 both parties concerned, the Representative of the Grantor, with
 the consent of the Hawaiian Government, having consented to
 the addition of a piece of ground to the original lot, not
 formerly included in it, in lieu of the alleged deprivation,
 and no Counter Claimant existing to the new arrangement,
 nor to any part of the agreement as above Cited,
 We accordingly confirm the present Claimant's behavior.

We accordingly confirm the present Claimant, his heirs
 executors, administrators, and assigns, in the same right
 and privileges in the lot commonly called "the point", and now
 including the additional piece under Part 2. and as they
 are both designated in their metes & bounds in the accom-
 panying separate surveys of J. Metcalf - as were granted





To the Land Commissioners, greetings: We, the children of Lihilahi, hereby tell of our lot.

Our makuakane, John C. Jones, gave this place to Lahilahi.

When Lahilahi died, this place was left to us, and we have held it peacefully, with no objections.

The diagram and the boundaries of this lot are sent herewith. Ranai* is a witness who knows of this place.

I am, with aloha, your obedient servant.

South 29° 30' East 46 feet 2 inches.

Containing an area of 377 square fathoms, 8 square feet,

The adobe wall of the side adjoining the lot of Kalama and of John Meek Jr. and the wall of the makai side of this land, are included in this survey.

Stephen Reynolds, sworn, These premises are situated in Honolulu and are a house lot, bounded:

Mauka by John Meek's Inn land

Ewa by heirs of Marini's land sold to Doctor Judd

Makai by some grass houses of John Marini which I believe is claimed as far as Drew's shop Waititi by Kalama's land, and crosses the lane at the back of J.J. Caranave.

It is partly fenced, partly bounded by other premises and partly open. I do not think there is any difficulty between claimants and their neighbours as to bounds.

These claimants are all children of Lahilahi, who was Marini's daughter, and obtained their right from her. The mother died in about 1844. The house which is stone was built by the father (Jones) in about 1832. The father is still living in Boston. There are also several straw houses on the land at the back of M. Casanave's. I do not know of anyone who ever disputed this place with the claimants. It is difficult to describe the turnings and inns and outs of it. The Survey of the General premises of the Marini lot, including this, as now shewn, appears to me to be correct as far as I am unacquainted.


I have not known who owns the place toward the sea

Some parts of this property have not been enclosed and there are houses on some parts and none on other parts of the land. I have not known that anyone has ever objected to this day.

At the time Manini's property had a general survey, I think it was correct that this place was being included in Manini's place.

This is a Claim for a House lot, situated in Honolulu Oahu. The Claimants, according to the Testimony received by the Commission, are all children of Pahitahi, daughter of Paa. F. Maini, and inherited this lot from their mother, who died in the Year 1844. The Father, F. Jones, is stated to be still living in Boston U. S. he having built the stone house at present standing on the Premises in the Year 1832, and represented to have given the Premises to his Wife Pahitahi, who left them to her Children.

As no Counter Claim has appeared to interfere with the Confirmation of the rights of the Claimants in this land, we accordingly Award to Francis C. Jones, Rosalie Jones,

and John Jones, the present Claimants, a fee-hold title to the lot herein described in the annexed Survey of A. J. Tammes, less than allodial, which they may Commute into a fee-simple title as prescribed by law.





UPON CONFIRMATION OF THE LAND COMMISSION.

Whereas, the Board of Commissioners to quiet Land Titles have by their decision awarded unto *Francis Rosalie and John Jones* — Claim No. 810

an estate of Freehold less than Allodial, in and to the land hereafter described, and whereas *the said parties have commuted the title as awarded for a Fee-Simple title by the payment of fifty dollars into the Royal Exchequer.*

Therefore, Kamehameha, by the grace of God, King of the Hawaiian Islands, by this Royal Patent, makes known unto all men, that he has, for himself and his successors in office, this day granted and given absolutely, in Fee Simple, unto *Francis Rosalie and John Jones*

all that certain piece of land situate at *Honolulu* in the Island of *Oahu* and described as follows:







One kula adjoins the house of Kekoa, also three of my lo`i adjoin there. Some lo`i are at the stream and the second kula is to the east of the kula of Naumu. The description of the remaining lo`is is that they are above. On the north are the lo`is of Naumu, on the east and the south, the kula of Manuela, on the west, the lo`is of Lililehua.

Keo Bolabola's land was small from Kawai, his father-in-law, in 1847. Kawai had received it from M. Kekuanaoa during the reign of Kinau. It has been an idle land and Kawai and his son-in-law built houses which are still standing at present. They lived peacefully and in 1851, Keo returned to Tahiti at which time he bequested the place to his father-in-law, for him to have just as he had received it in the beginning. He has been living peacefully to the present time. Now the heirs of Kahoowaha are opposing this claim. I have not known the reason for this action.

Kalua Pokohana, sworn, the testimony of Pokii was true because I had seen Kawai living on this place at the time the roads in Honolulu here were being broken in 1837. He built houses and has lived there to the present time. Now the heirs of Kahoowaha are objecting. I feel they are doing so without just reason.





To the president of the Land Commissioners to Quiet Land Titles whom the Mo`i has appointed to investigate the claims on the island of Oahu in the land of Honolulu, `ili of Kalawahine. I hereby state I am a claimant of farm land in the vineyard, a place made by my kupunakane, who fenced it, and planted the plants. When he died it was inkerited by my makuahine and on her death I inherited the occupancy of this claim. My representative will administer these claims of mine and to verify it it is proper for me to tell you, the Land Commissioners, as in your advertisement to the claimants to make their claims, of the truth of these claims. Farewell to you, the Land Commissioners.

I am, respectfully, your very humble servant.

Huanu, the claimant of a bequeathed mo`o in the `ili in Kewalo, and of the trees which were planted, coconut, wi, and some other plants, which are at Kaakaukui uka. All these things planted by my kupuna-kane are claimed at this time, where I am living.

P. Manini formerly held this land from Kamehameha I, having received it from him. On death of Manini it came to his daughter, Lahilahi and on her death to her children, Francis, John, & Rosalia. Francis is dead. The lot is fenced round & has been cultivated & never disputed. I have lived on this lot ever since time of Kamehameha I.

Kaoani, sworn, I saw the survey made by Mr. Turner & it is according to the wall of the lot. I have lived there since Kamehameha I and there is no dispute to the Title.

The Ewa lot I know nothing about.

Mauli, sworn, I have seen his vineyard at Kalawahine, Honolulu in 1 land section. It has been enclosed on all sides, these mark the boundaries. Land received by Manini, his grandfather from Kamehameha I a long time ago. Manini had always lived here and upon his death, the place was bequested to Lahilahi, his daughter where she had lived peacefully and died recently. Then this land had been willed to his children, Palakiko (Francis), Rosalia and Huanu (Juan). They are leading a peaceful life and plants are growing in this lot. I have always lived under them since the time of Kamehameha I to the present time.

Kaoani, sworn, I was there at the time this land was being surveyed and every statement made above is true, I have known in the same way. There have been no disputes.

Section 2 in Kewalo. Pauoa. Honolulu.

Kaapuiki, sworn, I have seen his land in Kawalo, Pauoa, Honolulu. This land had been for Kamehameha I. He gave it to Manini, Manini had willed it to Lahilahi upon his death and when she had died, it was bequested to her children. They are living here presently without oppositions.


I have not heard about the land in Ewa, nor have I seen it.

Pekoi, stated on oath, he claimed this land in the King's right, as the King's private property. Witness has now the management of it as Kaaiavaava had before him, who was placed there by the King. Kalauka at his death willed this land to Liliha, wife of Boki. She gave it to the King and he to Kaaivaava.

Kahaelealua, testified on oath, he knows the place and that Kaaiavaava has now possession of it. Lilihia gave it to him at Lahaina about 1841. When Kalauka was dying he was taken to Alualu and willed the land in question to Lilihia, to take care of it, and of his wife. Kaaiavaava married the wife of Kalauka after his death. Witness knows nothing about the King giving it, or of his title to it.

Jona Piikoi, sworn, says he knows the loko, called "Kaimakanaka," claimed by the King. It belonged in ancient times to Kamehameha I. I have always understood that this loko descended from Kamehameha I to Kamehameha II and from him to the present King. It was formerly a fish pond, but is now a salt pond. I do not know whether this loko is a part of "Kaakaukukui" or not. I never heard that the King had given away this pond to any person. I do no[t] know positively that it belongs to the King.

Kekuakahiko, sworn, says he has always understood that "Kaimakanaka" belonged to Kamehameha I and Kamehameha II and now to the King.

Keliiahonui, the late chamberlain put in this claim for the King, I presume.

Kealoha, sworn, says he knows the piece of land called "Peleula." I came to Oahu in the time of Kamehameha I. When Kamehameha I lived here he cultivated this land. Kuihelani was luna of this land for Kamehameha I. When the King returned to Hawaii the land still remained in charge of Kaumaumakea under Kuihelani. After the death of Kamehameha I, the land fell to Kamehameha II. Kaahumanu had charge of the land under Kamehameha II. "Peleula" is a part of the `ili of "Kaakaukukui." The ili of Kaakaukukui belonged to Kaahumanu from the time of Kamehameha I till her death. In the time of Kamehameha II, the people of Kaahumanu, Kekuanaoa &c cultivated "Peleula" for Kaahumanu.

After Kaahumanu's death the ili of "Kaakaukukui" fell to Kinau, but "Peleula" was considered as distinct and as belonging to the King. In the time of Kinau the present King cultivated Peleula, and Kinau and Kekuanaoa were lunas for the King on this land. After Kinau's death in 1839, Kekuanaoa had charge of "Peleula" for the King, and in 1845 I and the other Hulumanus assisted in planting this land with trees &c for the King.

(Cross-examined) This place was cultivated for Kamehameha I when I came from Hawaii.

B. Namakeha, sworn, says the land called "Peleula" was partly cultivated by Kamehameha I. I never know of his cultivating the land on the south side of Nuuanu Road. I knew of his sending people there sometimes to get sugar cane to send off to ships. When I came back from Maui in 1847, I saw Piikoi with the King's men planting there. I have heard the King tell his people to go and fetch potatoes from thence. I have heard the King order Piikoi & the Hulumanus to go and plant things there. I know the King had mortgaged this land previous to 1850. I heard the King had leased & afterwards sold a part of this land to G. Kisely.

Iona Piikoi, sworn, I do not know positively as to this land in ancient times but have heard that it was a kihapai of Kamehameha I. The same as to Kamehameha II and that it came from him to the present King. When the King came down from Lahaina in 1845, the King said to me "go to Kekuanaoa for Peleula." I went to Kekuanaoa and told him the King wanted "Peleula" to cultivate. Kekuanaoa consented, but said the land is mine & you may plant it under me. So I planted the land with the King's men. I leased a part of the land to G. Kisely for the King about the same time as I planted the kukui trees. Kekuanaoa made no opposition to the lease. At one time I recollect Kekuanaoa saying to me "I have heard the King & you have mortgaged "Peleula," I object to that."

When the King's claim was sent in for this land I spoke to him in regard to it, and he said yes, that is right, that land belonged to my father and then to my brother and then to me.

Kamehameha I had built these farms, Kamehameha III has them now.

Piikoi, sworn, I have seen these places for which the King is demanding. These patches were

Kaiui, sworn he has seen this place over which there is a dispute between Kamehameha and D. Baldwin over the boundaries between Moalii and Wahikuli in Lahaina of Maui.

When William Webster surveyed Wahikuli for the king, a small edge of Moalii was included in this survey. I was a stranger in this part as I lived there in 1847, but I learned the boundaries of Moalii and Wahikuli from Mahuka. The statements of this witness are not clear because he is very new here.

Keliipio, sworn, I am a native of Lahaina since the time of my grandparents and I was born at the time Kamehameha I returned from the battle of Nuuanu on Oahu. A ditch built anciently was the boundary separating Moalii and Wahikuli and it is still there at present.. When William Webster came to survey Wahikuli the land of the King, it was I who correctly directed him in the separation of the land. I am saying this is not hearsay but as having a personal knowledge from my parents. I hear now from some people that the sled course outside of the loi is old, but I say it is not. For this was there after I was born. I believe that my testimony is correct and the ditch is the true boundary.

Kealohapaalani, sworn (for D. Baldwin) I was born after the battle of Nuuanu. I have clearly seen the boundaries of these lands over which there is a dispute. The place called Kauluhina is the first boundary which closed Moalii with Kapunakea and adjoining the new government road; it runs irregularly from there to the Olowalu side until the cross of the woman called Makahuna. It runs irregularly from there to the head of the holua of Kalakumai, then joins Wahikuli, then it runs to upper Wahikuli while Moalii lies on the flat to Kalawa and running directly to the auwai adjoining Aki and turning back. I have seen this. It is not hearsay.

T. Keaweiui, sworn, seven years before the death of Kamehameha I, I had lived on this place and we planted potatoes because Moalii was my father and the laborers were for him. Moalii also distributed land and is still doing so at this time.


Kanakanui, sworn, I was born at Peleleu at the time of Kamehameha I. My mother, Ui, told me that the boundary which separated Moalii and Wahikuli was the auwai, just as Keliipio has

related above here. Above the auwai was for Wahikuli, but the auwai was from Moalii.

M. Kenau, sworn (for D. Baldwin) I know exactly as Kealohapaalani. He has spoken the truth I have heard from Hanole who is an uncle of mine and I have repeatedly seen this boundary since the time Liholiho had observed the ainoa to the present. I was born near this place about 17 years before the death of Kamehameha I.
