The Esteemed W.L. Lee, Esq., J.H. Smith, G.E. Robertson, John Ii, J, Kekaulahao, Greetings: I, Kewa, of Kuwili in Honolulu of the Fort, hereby enter my claim at Kuwili, with two lo`i in one parcel, bounded as follows: mauka, lo`i of Moeino, Waikiki, land of Kamaua, makai, land of Poomanu and of Kamaala, Ewa, Waianue, lo`i of N. Kekai. I got this from Kaniku before the commotion caused by Lord George Paulet, and have occupied it continuously since then, with no objections from anyone.

Because of my desire not to lose this place, I had entered a request to the Minister of the Interior with the diagram of a survey by Makalena, but have not heard his decision. When I heard that the people who lived on the fort lands could re-enter their claims, I decided to enter my claim before you, on this day.

Poomanu, sworn, I have seen his land at Kuwili ili of Honolulu, Oahu. there is only one section, two taro patches, and the boundaries are:

He has received this land from Kaniku when Kinau was serving as governor on Oahu. There are no koele's in it nor are there any poalima's. He has lived peacefully without objections to the present time. Because M. Kekuanaoa forbade it he did not enter a kuleana claim. I, Poomanu am the man that the governor has put in charge of Kuwili.





Land from M. Kekuaanoa in 1849, it is there peacefully to the present time. Kaniku in 1840, no disputes. The four patches in Hauhaukoi are poalimas and have been registered. Moeino has left some poalima patches numbering five for the government. The patch in Kunawai lele is not a poalima.

Moeino, sworn, I was placed in Hauhaukoi as konohiki for the fort in 1849, there were eight koeles in Hauhaukoi at the time I had received that land, the ninth of the patches was returned by the tenant and it was the fifth of the patches belonging to the government. The thirteen tenants of this land are Kaanaana, Openui, Wahie, Kalokea, Ka-mahalo, Kaahiki, Kaheana, Kapo, Keonekapu, Hololua, Kawanalama and Koahou.







Kalalilo, sworn, I have seen Aholo's claim of a patch and a house site section in the ili land of Kuuili just as Kapulani has related in the above, but I had seen him living there at the time of Wana, the first konohiki. After his return from the battle of Kauai.

Land from M. Kekuanaoa in 1849. Kapulani's lot is old and has been cut through by King Street leading out to Leleo, so Holiliamanu asked for a place for Naawailua and whi wife, Kapulani. M. Kekuanaoa gave them the place which Kimo had and where the slaughter house is located now. Kapulani lived there and in 1849 Holiliamanu told her ther he would register the claim in her name and return the papers to her when it was forwarded to him. Afte his death and later in 1849, it was discovered that Kele and Holiliamanu's wife had possession of the hosue lot so they evicted Kapulani. She complained to Governor M. Kekuanaoa about this, but, due to the fact that the land officers had made this valid, it was not possible to refute it. M. Kekuanaoa then gave Kapulani this place for having lost their place. This is the interest she is claiming now.

Hinaiuka, sworn, the statements made above are true, I have known in the same way.

Decision made – The place on which Kapulani is now living shall be for her in place of the place which was taken by Holiliamanu.



To the Honorable Board of Commissioners for quieting Land Claims
Gentlemen:

In compliance with your requisition I respectfully beg to state that I lay claims to the following lands, namely

1st a plot of land situate on what is generally now called Broadway in Honolulu, formerly known as King Street of the size & boundaries following:

[DIAGRAM] Title in diagram "Rising Sun Public House"

The above plot of land was given me in the year 1822 by Kalaimoku (Pitt) in return for services rendered, and stock and goods furnished to him by me. I built a house many years ago on the above land which was known as the dog & bell, and I have since rebuilt & improved much upon the land, and my present house is known as the Rising Sun Public House. I have held possession about (23) twenty-tree years.

[margin note:] No. 275B

2nd. I lay claim to lands (the limits of which are not precisely defined) situated at Palama, one called "Kilikili Awa" on the upper part thereof; and consisting of 9 kalo patches; and on the lower part to land called "Poe Poe," consisting of 19 or more kalo patches. These lands are intersected by lands belonging to other people, and were bought by me of his Majesty, Kamehameha 1st in the month of November 1813 or thereabouts. I gave him 40\$ in cash, powder &c for them.

I shall feel obliged by your notifying me when you may require my attendance; or any explanation, or to produce witnesses if required; and I am willing to undertake to pay all proper expences [sic] attending these my claims, and have the honor to be, Gentlemen, &c. &c.

Claim No. 275, Henraij Zupplien, October 6 [1848]

Consisting of 2 claims.

1st, In Honolulu, nearly opposite the Bethel in Chapel St.

3. In Palama, the upper part called Kilikili awa, having 9 kalo patches. The lower part called

Poepoe consisting of 19 kalo patches, as stated in the claim.

William Kanui, sworn testified, It is bounded by:

Chapel St. on the sea side
Yard of Nicholson, East
Hikiau & Austin, North
Mainae, West.

Claimant has lived there from 1823, when witness first knew him. Kalaimoku came here after that time; who gave liquor &c to sell for Mutual profit. Claimant has lived on the land ever since. Witness acted under them in receiving, trading, and paying work people and became acquainted with claimant in that way. The land is fenced in; and was larger at first than it is now; part having been taken off by the road, and people building. No one can dispute the Right of claimant to this land.

2. Palama

Kalau, sworn, He knows the Palama land.

Kalakuohio's land is East
Kapaloa is south
A. Aikuo[?] is West
Kauka Maku, North

Claimant has owned the place since Kamehameha 1st from when he got it, and has held it ever since, having lived there from youth till grown old. There is only one resident, named Kahalau. This relates only to Kilikili awa, the upper part.

Hanunu, testified on oath, The land is in Palama &

on the North is a small stream
On the east is Kaainapuaa
On south, Pulolei
On West, Naowala.

It was given by Kamehameha to claimant and has been in his possession ever since. There has been no counter claim to it. Only one man is living on the land named Kalua, and he is under claimant.

Kalua, sworn stated, The testimony of Hanunu is true concerning Kilikili awa. He knows claimant has been a long time in possession. He has heard from time of Kamehameha 1st and never heard of any counter claimant or other konohiki.

Poepoe is bounded:

On North by Kaikai's land
 On East and South by William Harbottle's land, and
 Kaikai's extends on the West.

This land has been regularly in the possession as long as the other. Some of the kalo patches were taken off a long time ago, originally belonging to the land. And the Konohiki was never called to account; nor the patches restored. Witness has known the claimant to have lived there ever since Kaahumanu's time and always heard the land was obtained from Kamehameha 1st. he thinks there are 7 patches and a fish pond. The claimant has had undisturbed possession to the present time.

A freehold title voted.

No. 275, H. Zupplien, October 6 [1847]

Kanui, sworn by the Word of God and stated, I had seen Zupplien in the -year 1822 living on the place that he is claiming now and in the year 1823 Kalaimoku had come and had given that place to Zupplien. It is mauka of Chapel Street; on the east is Kale and Lokai's lot; on the north, is the store of the husband of Kaulukane, also the lot of Hikiau and on the west side is Mainae's place. This is Kapiliena's (Zupplien) property from Kalaimoku. Goats and liquor are the reasons Kalaimoku had given that land to him. The place has been enclosed and there is a house in there. I had been to his house frequently at that time. No one else has interest there but it is his place that has been taken away in small sections. I have not seen the land at Kapalama.

Kahalau, sworn by the Word of God and stated, I have seen Zupplien's property at Kapalama. Kilikiliana is the name. Keahupuaa is on the northern side; Kahakuohia on the east; Kekai's property on the south and Ahaikuou is on the western side. Zupplien had acquired this land during the lifetime of Kamehameha I and he had received it from the king. He has lived there since then to the present time; no one has objected.

Hanunu, sworn by the Word of God and stated, This land is at Nuhelewai and Kilikiliaua is the name.

A stream is on the north
 Kainapuaa on the east
 Puulole on the south and
 Nauole is on the western side.

Zupplien had received this land during the reign of Kamehameha I. Kamehameha had given it to Zupplien. He was the only konohiki there. 6 attendants are living there with Kalua as caretaker.

Kalua. sworn by the Word of God and stated, My knowledge is the same as the one that has been revealed here concerning the land. I have heard that Zupplien had lived there from Kamehameha 1's time. There is also a lele there named Kapoepoe. The property of Kekai is on the northern

part of that lele;

Harbottle's property on the east
and Kekai's place is on the southern and western parts.

That land is in our possession but some patches are gone. This lele and the land, too, are from Kamehameha I. The patches had been given away at the time of Kaikiowa. I had seen Zuppien living there during the lifetime of Kaahumanu. I have heard only that his land had been from Kamehameha I. The lele has 19 patches and one pond. Three were given

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Claim No. 275-B Henry Zupplien

This is a claim for 3 distinct pieces of land in the district of Palama, Oahu. These lands are called "Doejoe" "Kilikili'awa" (Makai) and Kilikili'awa (Mauka)

From the testimony taken, there can be no question of Claimant's title to these lands: they having been given to him by Kamohamoha I. and ever since occupied by him in undisturbed peace.

According to the first Rule of the Board the Claimant's title is clear, and we therefore award to Henry Zupplien, a freehold Estate - less than allodial, or in other words, a life Estate - in said lands; which he may convert into a fee-simple title by commutation according to the law. The boundaries of these lands are described in the annexed Surveys of J. Mabel Esq. dated 23 February 1848.





No. 3. Also a Kalo land in Kalihi which I got from Kamehameha III in 1824, with boundaries all well known & defined.

Lease 6. I will also notify Your Honorable Body of the Existence of two Leases which I hold of the Lands, known by the names of Kalauwai and Leihue [Lihue] on this Island.*

John Ii, sworn, I know the place. The boundaries have been correctly given by Namauu. I have always heard Boki gave claimant the land, and have known him to occupy and build upon it more than 26 years. There were no houses there when he began to build. He took it, fenced it, built on it, &c, and has lived there ever since. I know no opposition to this claim.

[margin notes:] This testimony was taken by President Lee. Note: 26th November Mr. Ii this claim reported the King's acknowledgement of his signature & validity of the instrument, heaving it to the Board to perfect all defects of this. J.H.S.

No. 3. Is kalo land at Kalihi. Claimant got it from Kamehameha III in 1824.

No. 4. Is kalo land in Kapalama called Kuwili [illegible section] Kaikeoewa in 1832 by Captain Thomas Meek. It is not fenced.

Kekuaanaoa, sworn, I know the place, and that [illegible] Meek's brother owned it and transferred it [to] claimant, with consent [of] the King and Kinau [in] 1835. His [illegible] the same day as my own land given by the King at the time.

Lease or leases for Leihue, Kalauao, being without a witness, was the [illegible] of their being sent to the King [?] of Kalauao was only produced & sent. T.H.J.[?] Secretary

No. 5. Is a small tract of land in the district of Makiki, got from Kamehameha III, in 1840.

Kekuaanaoa, sworn, I went with the King, Haalilio and others to the place, when Captain Meek said, I want a place for my cattle, when the King replied, well, here is one, take it, of which gift there were many witnesses. I and Haalilio measured it off, and it was fenced about the same time.

2. This property is in Honolulu here. It had been given to John Meek by Poki in the year 1817 and he has lived there since that time to the present.

Namaau sworn by the Word of God and stated, "I have seen John Meek's place here in Honolulu. It is mauka of Chapel St; on the Waikiki side is Punahale's place Mauka, Hotel St. and Ewa, Kaluahinenui's place.

John Meek had received this from Poki just after the arrival of Bingham and has lived there since that time to the present. I haven't known that anyone has objected."

John Ii, sworn by the Word of God and stated, "The boundaries are the same as Namaau has just stated here and I have heard only that John Meek's interest had been from Poki. I think that it was in the year 1826 that the houses had been built. It had been an idle land formerly. It had been enclosed and a well had been dug. He has lived there since to this time. No one has ever objected."

3. "There is another (land) at Kalawao in Ewa. Kamehameha had given (land) in the year 1824 and residence was since then to the present time; however, here is something which is not clear. The date has not been noted in that document; therefore, we will put aside the document for a very short while until there is time to do this work."

4. M. Kekuaanoa, sworn by the Bible and stated, "this land is at Kapalama in Honolulu here and I had heard this. Thomas Meek had mentioned that it had been Kinau's land. John Meek had the land, the fence and all other things. Thomas Meek's interest had been from Kaikioewa, but it is not clear to me when Kaikioewa had given Thomas Meek that place. I think he lived there just as his older brother had and in the same way we had all lived there.

5. Another land is in Waikiki on Oahu here. When we had gone (on a trip) with Haaliho [Haalilio] and the king also, John Meek at this time asked the king for land and the king had

consented to this. It was a cattle raising pasture and we (two) approved just as it has been approved by the king.

The place has been enclosed with a stone wall, The side that is adjoining to my lot has a mud fence;

On the Ewa side is Kekuanaoa's lot

Mauka is the stone wall Kaaihu for the lease land

Waikiki a ditch and

On the makai side is the place for John Ii's attendant.

This place is for none other but John Meek and the Hawaiians who are living there.

In the Evidence taken in this claim, it appears, that the claimant acquired this land from his Brother Captain Thomas Meek who, with the consent of the King Kamehameha 2 and Kīna'u the Premier, transferred it to the Claimant, about the Year 1838, and that the Claimant has been in peaceable possession of the same, from that time, down to the present. The witness adds - "the title of Cap: John Meek to this land is the same as my title to lands given me by the King." There is no Evidence before the Board, as to manner or time in which Cap: Thomas Meek became possessed of this land - but from the statement of the Claimant which is undoubtedly correct, this land was given to Captain Thomas Meek by Kāheoewa in the Year 1832.

In the opinion of the Board, the Claimant's title is rendered perfectly clear, by the evidence, and the laws enacted for the Government of this Board, and we do hereby award to the Claimant, John Meek a title, equal to that of any Chief owning lands acquired by Gift from the King - namely, a freehold title, less than allodial in the land "Kūwili," as bounded and described in the annexed Survey of J. Metcalf Esq: made on 22nd of February A.D. 1848.

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



I, Kahaleaahu, am her kane and I will administer the place. My wahine and the kaikunane and makuahine all decided together that I would be the one to administer it, not themselves, only myself, and they would be under me. If I die, they will regain the administration of their old place.

A portion has been fenced and a portion has not. This is the claim which is explained to you, the people who quiet titles.





Greetings to the Land Commissioners of the Hawaiian Islands: I, Keakahiwa, am the one who petitions for my claims to my three taro patches. The interest in two patches is very old, from M. Kekuanaoa who was the konohiki from whom I got these patches. I got one patch from Kaniku, the konohiki. Here are the dimensions of the patches from M. Kekuanaoa, who was the konohiki; First patch is, on the north, 26 fathoms 3 feet, on the east, 21 fathoms 1 foot, on the south, 38 fathoms 4 feet, on the west, 12 fathoms 3 feet. The rear patch is, on the north, 31 fathoms 4 feet, on the east, 12 fathoms 3 feet, on the south, 26 fathoms 4 feet, on the west, 7 fathoms 3 feet, that is the first one.

Here is the second:

Kaniku is the konohiki from whom I got this single patch. On the north, 15 fathoms 4 feet, on the east, 15 fathoms 2 feet, on the south 18 fathoms 3 feet, on the west, 3 fathoms 4 feet. These are my claims for which I petition you, the Land Commissioners.

To the Land Commissioners: I, the one whose name is below, hereby state my claim to you, the Commissioners of the Independent King of the Hawaiian Islands. There are five taro lo`i and also a half of a lo`i, in the `Ili of Kaukahoku in the Ahupua`a of Kapalama and also a house lot in the `Ili of Keoneula. The length of the occupation of this house lot is from the time of Kaomi to the present.

Kuheleloa, sworn, I have seen his land at Kaukahoku in Kapalama - 3 land sections.

Sections 1 & 2 are from me given in 1836. Kekai, the konohiki, had given me my interest. Kekai had given him section 3 in 1834 where he has lived to the present. No one has objected.

Kekai /konohiki/, sworn, Everything which has been mentioned above is true and I have known similarly.
