In our last phone call regarding Section 4(f) impacts on the Chinatown Historic District, Chris suggested that we could use a "no use" analysis for the Chinatown historic district. At the time, you were told that there was no use of historic property in the Chinatown historic district. However, our planner followed up and there are contributing buildings on the parking lot property. The other reason we used the current Section 4(f) approach was based on the adverse effects related to design, feeling, and association.
