

MEETING RECAP

FEBRUARY 12, 2011

TRADITIONAL CULTURAL PROPERTIES CONSULTATION

On February 12, 2011, in accordance with the recently executed Honolulu High-Capacity Transit Corridor Project's Programmatic Agreement as required by Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, the City met with the community to discuss previously unidentified Traditional Cultural Properties (TCPs). This meeting was the first step under the Programmatic Agreement to continue consultation and conduct a study of previously unidentified TCPs.

The meeting focused on:

- **Defining TCPs and how it applies to the Project**
- **Identifying how information is collected and evaluated**
- **Discussing potential sources of information and locations**
- **Outlining how information will be used in the future**

After presenting information about TCPs and the consultation process, the City asked two questions:

1. **Are there places along or near the project area that are associated with cultural practices or beliefs that are rooted in your community's history and are important in maintaining the cultural identity of your community?**
2. **Who are the best people in your community to talk to about these places and their importance? Would you be willing to help in identifying these people?**

NEXT STEPS

The City will follow up on information that community members provided during the meeting. Through consultation and research, the City will conduct a study to:

- **Research previously unidentified places that may be eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places; and**
- **Identify concerns about these historic properties.**

As part of the consultation process, the City will also seek input from the community to:

- **Advise on the identification and evaluation of historic properties;**
- **Articulate views on the project's effects on historic properties; and**
- **Participate in the mitigation of adverse effects.**
